Research contributions: overview

Philosophy of Mind and Cognition. My work is animated by the 'distributed cognition' framework of Hutchins and Clark. I'm leading advocate of a '2nd-wave' approach to this idea that cognitive processes can spread across brain, body, and social and material world. I am one of few to apply rather abstract frameworks of 'embodied cognition' to memory. My work on skill and expertise has been influential in reviving naturalistic work on this topic, integrating philosophy of mind with sport science and music cognition, and expanding into recent ethnographic work on performance, dance and film.

Cognitive Science. Unusually for a philosopher, I have gained skills in experimental cognitive science and psychology. With Barnier & Harris, I have expanded study of collaborative recall to autobiographical and emotionally significant memories. We examine the functions of shared memories in small groups, especially couples and expert teams, identifying interactive micro-processes that support emergent outcomes of remembering together. This experimental work on socially distributed remembering grounds new taxonomies of the dimensions of distributed cognition, and has driven a transformation in cognitive psychology: social influences on memory are no longer seen primarily as sources of confusion and distortion of individual memory, but as essential ongoing scaffolding.

Cognitive Humanities. I work in history of philosophy and science, and (more recently) cognitive literary/ cultural history. Early work reinterpreted Descartes on passions and brain/ body/ world relations; C17 & C18 theories of memory and self; and sciences of neural transmission. This work helped historians to see cognitive scientists as potential allies. In social science, I've contributed on memory in linguistics, cognitive archaeology, and media theory. My work on 'exograms' and 'the cognitive life of things' integrates ideas about cognitive artefacts with historical studies of material culture. With Tribble, I develop an interdisciplinary framework for cognitive cultural history, focussing on cognitive ecologies of skill in early modern England, and respond to scepticism on cognitive science in literary theory.

Current research projects and selected collaborations

1. *Collaborative Embodied Performance: ecologies of skill*, a volume coedited with Kath Bicknell, was delivered in full to Bloomsbury on June 2, 2021. Publication will be 27 January 2022. This springs from ongoing work in my *Cognitive Ecologies* group, funded by the Australian Research Council, with Bicknell (Performance Studies/ Cognitive Science), Wayne Christensen (Philosophy, Barcelona), Greg Downey (Anthropology), and associated PhD students
2. *Cognitive Ecologies: skills, histories, emotions*, co-authored with Lyn Tribble (English, U Connecticut), is contracted with Cambridge University Press's *Elements* series: we will deliver full typescript in September, publication early 2022.
3. Maurice Halbwachs, *The Social Frameworks of Memory*. I am editor of this first full English translation of the 1925 classic, contracted to Oxford University Press. Translated by Barnaby Hutchins and Charles T. Wolfe, introduction and editorial material by John Sutton: I will deliver full typescript to OUP in late 2021, publication in 2022.
4. *Porous Memories: an essay on distributed cognitive ecologies*. This book, contracted to Oxford UP, has been delayed by bereavement and cancer treatment. It needs minor revamping, and will be completed by mid-2022.
5. 'Memory as a Cognitive Gadget': new collaboration with Cecilia Heyes (Oxford), Johannes Mahr & Daniel Schacter (Harvard), and Penny van Bergen (Macquarie). We integrate cognitive neuroscience, cultural evolution, and developmental psychology to argue that the capacity to distinguish memory from imagination is culturally learned. *Perspectives in Psychological Science* accepted our proposal for a full paper, which we will submit by October 2021.

Graduate and Undergraduate Teaching: summary

Graduate Teaching

Since 2008, I have taught seven semester-long graduate seminars, for new PhD students and/or Masters research students. These seminars provided a shared basis for interdisciplinary research with methods from psychology, philosophy, neuroscience, computer science, linguistics, and cognitive anthropology. With pressure on students – especially international students – to complete the PhD fast, these seminars forge common ground.

Summer Schools and International Teaching

Undergraduate Honours Teaching and Supervision

Honours is an advanced 4th-year undergraduate pathway to the PhD. I taught five distinct units at 4th-year Honours level (1993-1994, 2000-2001, 2004, 2008) and supervised eight Honours thesis projects (six in Philosophy, two in Psychology): six of these students were awarded 1st-class Honours, two awarded Honours 2.1.

Undergraduate Teaching

The bulk of my undergraduate teaching was in the Department of Philosophy at Macquarie before I took on a higher administrative load as Head of Department in 2004 and then moved to a research-intensive position in Cognitive Science in 2008. In that earlier period, I taught history of philosophy, philosophy of mind and cognition, and a range of other areas of philosophy, and in Max Coltheart's undergraduate Cognitive Science unit.

I received a Macquarie University **Outstanding Teacher Award** in 2002. In an external review of Philosophy's undergraduate programs, the external assessor (Paul Redding, Sydney) described my 3rd-year course *Philosophy and Cognitive Science* as 'a very impressive offering', showing 'an exceptional degree of thoughtfulness', commended the unit's creative interaction between philosophical traditions, and concluded that it 'was strikingly impressive in design'.

In Cognitive Science, I developed a new 2nd-year undergraduate unit *Memory*, open to students from all backgrounds, and taught it in 2018 and 2021. I developed a new 3rd-year undergraduate unit *Embodied Cognition and Skilled Performance*, now offered for the second time, specifically for students enrolled in our new degree program.

I have presented guest lectures at Macquarie and other universities in Ancient History, Modern History, Physics, Psychology, Sociology, and Screen Studies. In 1991 at the University of Sydney I taught a full unit *Plato & Aristotle*.

Teaching Grants and Curriculum Innovation

I have been awarded four teaching development grants (1994, 2001, 2012, and 2014) for curriculum design, online materials, and educational research in Philosophy and Cognitive Science, with colleagues including Max Coltheart.

I began my career at Macquarie in the Philosophy Department with a heavy teaching load and a keen interest in interdisciplinary practice. I led or participated in various initiatives for new undergraduate programs across Philosophy, Psychology, and Biology before Cognitive Science became an autonomous centre.

From 2012, I initiated the development of a new undergraduate major in Cognitive Science (previously a research-only ARC-funded research centre), working closely with colleagues in Philosophy and Psychology. This developed into a full undergraduate degree, the Bachelor of Cognitive and Brain Sciences, unique in Australia. I directed our early undergraduate programs, before I hired Dr David Kaplan who now leads a successful degree with high enrolments.

Graduate teaching

In Cognitive Science from 2008, I worked with faculty colleagues to implement graduate seminar requirements for all new PhD students. These seminars provided a shared basis for interdisciplinary research with methods from psychology, philosophy, neuroscience, computer science, linguistics, and cognitive anthropology. With pressure on students – especially international students – to complete the PhD fast, these seminars forge common ground. I have also contributed to MRes teaching.

Representative Course: *Philosophy and Cognitive Science*

Development

I designed this 3rd-year undergraduate course from scratch, drawing on experience teaching cognitive science to Psychology students with Professor Max Coltheart. I worked with colleagues Peter Menzies and Tim Bayne on the structure of our philosophy of mind curriculum. Many students in this course went on to Honours and graduate research in Philosophy or Psychology, and some on into research careers in the interdisciplinary cognitive sciences.

I also developed a distance version of the course for Open Learning Australia, taught since 2004. Working closely with distance education specialists, I recorded customised lectures that continue to draw to Macquarie a small number of outstanding students from outside the university system.

Macquarie’s Deputy Vice-Chancellor John Loxton noted in response that ‘PHIL363 is very impressive in the way it ties structure to outcomes, particularly those concerned with generic skills’.

Teaching grants and curriculum innovation

I began my career at Macquarie in the Philosophy Department with a heavy teaching load and a keen interest in interdisciplinary practice. In 1999 I chaired a cross-disciplinary committee that developed a new template for joint Philosophy and Psychology majors in both BA and BSc degrees, allowing students to take a range of Philosophy courses while completing the Psychology units required for APS (Australian Psychological Society) accreditation.

A parallel committee on which I worked with Mark Westoby (Biology) and Max Coltheart and Sandra Cotton (Psychology) designed a more interdisciplinary degree template '*Mind, Brain, and Behaviour*' in which students select from streams of specified courses in Philosophy, Psychology, and Biology.

After joining the Department of Cognitive Science in 2008, I worked with colleagues to design and implement an outstanding interdisciplinary undergraduate program in Cognitive Science. The department arose from a research centre formed by Max Coltheart in 2000 and we appointed Dr David Kaplan, a philosopher and neuroscientist from the PNP (Philosophy-Neuroscience-Psychology) program at Washington University, St Louis, to work with me on these new initiatives. Dr Kaplan has driven extraordinary success in our teaching.

Milestones include:

- taking the Cognitive Science undergraduate teaching proposals through faculty and university approval processes
- oversight of our first undergraduate courses ('Delusions and Disorders of Mind', and 'Brain and Language') in 2013
- gradually growing the number, scope, and size of our undergraduate courses
- implementing our major new undergraduate program in Cognitive and Brain Sciences in 2016
- substantial growth in income from undergraduate teaching in the department, from zero before 2012
- potential to make new staff appointments on the strength of new teaching income
